Section I – Disorders includes 211 major disorder chapters, that comprise more than 260 specific disorders, diseases or conditions. Arranged alphabetically from Achondroplasia to Wilson Disease, each chapter begins with an extensive description, written in understandable language. Each description includes: Disorder Name and Synonyms, Primary Symptoms, Physical Findings, Related Disorders, Cause, Disorder Type, Standard Treatment and Bodily System Affected. Following each description are disorder-specific resources, including Associations, State Agencies, Support Groups, Libraries, Resource Centers, Research Centers, Web Sites, Media Resources, and Camps. All disorder descriptions in this edition have been reviewed and revised by medical professionals to include the most up-to-date methods of diagnoses and treatment.

Section II – General Resources includes over 1,000 resources, such as National Associations, Support Groups, Newsletters, Books and Magazines that are not limited to a specific disorder, but offer information and support for a wide range of issues and pediatric disorders. Users will find resources on not only physical pediatric disorders, but also on mental and emotional conditions as well as resources that deal with multi-disorder conditions.

Section III – The Human Body provides a comprehensive overview of the human body, beginning with the structure and function of human cells and tissues, continuing on to bodily systems, and then to prenatal and postnatal growth and development. This information enables the reader to broaden their understanding of how specific disorders relate to the body. The disorder descriptions in Section I reference those bodily systems that are affected by a particular disorder.

Section IV – Glossary contains a guide to medical terminology and provides important navigational tips and more than 200 commonly used medical prefixes, roots, and suffixes to help readers decipher terms they may encounter in the disorder descriptions, or in other resources they are using.

Section V – Guidelines for Obtaining Additional Information and Resources assists parents and caregivers that are interested in obtaining more information on such diverse topics. It is also useful to physicians who specialize in certain pediatric disorders, accredited hospitals, approved drugs or medical devices for certain pediatric conditions, or current clinical trials that are investigating possible new therapies for particular diseases.

Section VI – Indexes are included to help readers access the information by several different ways: Entry Index, Geographic Index and Subject Index.
